The Keys to Success program Holly Godfree and Lori Korodaj

The world of employment is changing, and employers are looking for employees with more "generic" 21st Century skills like critical thinking. In response to this and in the context of high levels of misinformation, schools are increasingly focussing on the General Capabilities, a teacher librarian's bread and butter. However, declining numbers of teacher librarians in P-10 schools mean that many students are not mastering these skills before they come to Year 11. Teacher librarians at Lake Tuggeranong College created the *Keys to Success* program to fill these gaps.

This session will be useful to secondary school practitioners looking to fill the gaps for their students and for primary school practitioners with an eye on transitions who want their students to avoid those gaps in the first place.

Holly Godfree coordinates the *Students Need School Libraries* campaign, striving to ensure that every student has access to a dynamic, well-resourced school library run by qualified library staff. She currently works as a teacher librarian at Lake Tuggeranong College in Canberra and as a sessional marker for teacher librarian students at Charles Sturt University. In 2019, Holly was named the ASLA Australian Teacher Librarian of the Year.

School newsrooms: more than a lesson in journalism Dhana Quinn

Dhana Quinn, who co-wrote *Kid Reporter: the secret to breaking news*, argues producing a school newspaper (or podcast) is not merely a vehicle to churn out future journalists. Rather, it's a dynamic platform with many opportunities for learning. In this masterclass, Dhana will discuss how school newsrooms can boost students' media literacy skills through assessing and producing information in the form of a news story, picture or product. She will also outline how students can develop emotional and social skills, learn practical life-long skills like time-management and teamwork, gain an insight into what it means to be an active and informed citizen, and have a meaningful platform for expression.

Dhana Quinn has worked as a radio, television and print journalist for *The Age, Crinkling News* and the ABC. She was also a presenter on the ABC's education program *Behind the News*. She has a master's degree in international and community development and qualifications in editing and English language teaching. She cowrote *Kid Reporter* with Saffron Howden who founded and edited Australia's only national newspaper for young people, *Crinkling News*.
